Spring Gathering

Volunteer Activities in 2018

- 1. In the enclosed area of Bruntsfield Links, turf was lifted to create a wildflower patch to encourage pollinators. Seed was scattered but because of the drought, 95% of the seed did not germinate. We were left with a bare area that was going to look awful and likely to get trampled on by children. A request was made to the council nursery at The Inch for anything they could provide. They gave us 200 small annuals, which were planted. The next issue was water as the drought continued so 10 gallons of water were sprinkled over the patch every day for weeks. The annuals grew and thrived and were actually still looking colourful at the start of November.
- 2. A small extra shed to house tools has been erected behind the Cricket Pavilion.
- 3. Several clean up sessions took place clearing litter and leaves and encroaching weeds around benches.
- 4. FoMBL assisted the proprietor of the cafe at the Cricket Pavilion to have a tidy up around the Pavilion and birdbath area.
- 5. The three large planters at the entrance to Bruntsfield Links on Bruntsfield Crescent have been tended, watered, mulched, pruned and added to, to give colour. They are still looking good.
- 6. A resident in Greenhill Terrace offered FoMBL a lot of homegrown mulch. A plan was made to weed and mulch around the young trees in the enclosed area of Bruntsfield Links as fears were raised that these young trees were going to perish in the drought. A number of volunteers worked on this and probably saved the young trees (particularly the three new Rowans that have been planted in thanks to Heather Goodare for her tireless work with FoMBL).
- 7. The bowser was used on several occasions to water trees on the Meadows. It holds enough to water 7-8 trees, giving them approximately two gallons each. The bowser cannot be filled to the top as it becomes unstable. It is also very heavy to push or pull.
- 8. The plaque for Heather Goodare was designed and ordered and installed in concrete beside the second of the three Rowan trees planted for Heather.
- 9. A tree group was formed and met with Council officers in charge of trees on council property. A very useful walkabout took place and a plan of action to care for trees on the Meadows and Bruntsfield Links was hatched.
- 10. A meeting took place with a small after-school club from Heriots to discuss ways they might assist FoMBL. They are very enthusiastic. Another local school are keen to help and we are waiting to hear back from them.
- 11. More bulbs were planted in mid November 1000 bluebells (see photo below).

There had been no community defibrillators available at the Meadows in Edinburgh. People of all health and ages use the Meadows every week to enjoy sport and early defibrillation saves lives.





Lily and Isla with the help of the community have raised £1678.70!! After just-giving fees this should leave £1550 to pay for the Meadows to have their first defibrillator with a heated secure outdoor storage box.

It is planned that the defibrillator will be attached to the Tennis Pavilion, which will be a great thing for the Meadows to have. Hopefully over time the charity will be able to find others to be interested in funding more for the Meadows and for the rest of Edinburgh. Project Update

Playground equipment

Neil Roger is working with Alan Grevers (playground officer) to choose appropriate new equipment for the Links playground and Toddler playground at East Meadows. It is hoped this equipment can be installed before the summer. Fund provided is around £7000.



We are pleased that the council has now fitted two self-closing gates at the Magnet playground to help prevent dog entry. This has been requested by FOMBL over several years.

Worn grass areas

The grass areas to the sides of the access path from Lonsdale Terrace have now been fenced off to prevent further erosion of grassed areas. The railing is similar in material and design to those erected at the Chalmers Street entrance. Following completion the worn areas will be raked and seeded. This work will cost about £7000.

The parking/access area adjacent to the Cricket Pavilion has become a muddy unsightly area and so this will be tarmaced with grassed areas edged in concrete upstands. It is hoped this will extend up to the council store. This work will cost about £6000 and should be completed by April.

Worn out muddy corners at many paths will be tackled later in the year.

Tree labels

Mike Shields has agreed to fund a first stage of tree labelling at £250. The labels will look the same as those in the Botanic Gardens. He has also agreed to fund tree information wooden posts.

Restoration of wooden benches

FoMBL have had ongoing discussions with council officials and the prison pay back officer about restoring worn wooden benches. This has not yet been resolved but it is hoped action can be taken this year

Information Boards

The Nelson Pillars information lectern draft text is nearing completion and this will be circulated for comment soon. The Royal Infirmary information lectern text is being finalised by a working group of University staff.

Wildflower meadows

There will be a meeting held in mid-March to discuss the enlargement and management of the Leamington Walk wildflower area. Buglife will continue to provide funding and staff to augment planting along the John Muir Way. It is hoped that local Schools will be involved in planting up areas as well as other voluntary work.
