### **Constitution and Trustees**

The Charity is a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (a SCIO). It was registered with OSCR on 3rd September 2015. It has a two-tier structure with membership open to the public and a board of elected trustees who are also members of the charity.

Trustees are elected or re-elected at the annual general meeting and additional trustees may be elected at any time during the year. There must be a minimum of three and a maximum of fifteen trustees. We are always interested in expressions of interest from members who wish to become trustees.

## **Objectives and Activities**

## **Charitable Purposes**

The organisation was established for charitable purposes only. These are:

- Advancement of Arts, Heritage, Culture or Science. To promote the historical value
  of the area, its scenic, architectural, landscape and ecological qualities for the
  enjoyment of people living and visiting the area.
- Advancement of Environmental Protection or Improvement. To encourage conservation, protect, enhance and improve the landscape, biodiversity and sustainable use for the benefit of people and wildlife.
- Advancement of Citizenship or Community Development. To engage and involve local community in environmental issues and action through information exchange, educational and practical activities.

### **Activities**

Once again, members of Friends of the Meadows and Bruntsfield Links have worked hard all year to protect this historic park. We are very fortunate to have so many active members and local residents owe them a huge debt of gratitude. As at March 2025 we had 112 members compared to 103 last year. These members are mainly individuals but also include, for example, community councils and student groups.

The tree group have planted thousands of new native trees and bushes across several areas of the park in recent years, notably the Southwest area of the Links, with help from dozens of local school pupils, and around the tennis courts and the east playground. The group and volunteers have also continued to water them and surround them with mulch. The volunteer group also met throughout the year to collect litter and leaves and remove weeds and graffiti among other tasks. Two of our volunteers from the above groups (Neil Roger and Alison Carr) received a Community Hero award from local MP Ian Murray during the year.

Extensive areas of wildflower meadow have also been maintained and improved during the year with thousands of new bulbs and flowers planted or seeded. Now that their work is done, Scottish Water's extensive former compound area off Marchmont Road is being restored at their expense this summer. We continue to encourage the council to adopt a relaxed policy towards mowing grassy areas to encourage biodiversity.

Our project activity this year was less extensive than usual with no significant equipment installation projects unlike the previous year when the log cabin was installed.

The new toilet block at the corner of Middle Meadow Walk and Melville Drive opened in late summer. This is very welcome as a new toilet has been one of the primary objectives of FoMBL

for many years.

Our main way of communicating with members is through our excellent regular newsletters which are always full of great photos and updates. These are available to read on the FoMBL website. We also maintain a FoMBL Facebook group with 4,500 members.

All three of our public meetings were very successful during the year. Local historian Eric Melvin gave a talk in April 2024 entitled "Tales of The Southside - A Misadventure; an eccentric judge; an afternoon tea party and some childhood memories". At our AGM in late June Professor David Purdie gave a wonderful illustrated talk on "The Burnses, father & son, and the Meadows" (the son being our national poet Robert Burns). The focus of our Autumn 2024 meeting was a talk from David Kyles from the local Parks and Greenspaces Office. David outlined the council's partnerships and plans such as the place of the Meadows in the Edinburgh Biodiversity Action Plan 2022-2027. We also had a very enjoyable Christmas social event in the Black Ivy. The Lowe family who own it have been very supportive of FoMBL over the years.

## Financial summary and reserves policy

The charity remains in a healthy financial position with £13,760 in the bank at the end of March. We have very few fixed costs and a substantial regular income and so we have no need for an official "reserves policy".

In terms of committed expenditure, £3,763 was carried over from the prior year (£300 for new play equipment and £3,463 for information panels in association with Edinburgh World Heritage). £2,145 has been pledged towards a new table tennis table on the Links, £750 for painting and trees and £1000 for the Barclay corner. The total restricted funds balance at the year-end was £7,658.

### Notes to the accounts for the year ending 31st March 2025

### 1 Basis of accounting

These accounts have been prepared on the Receipts and Payments basis in accordance with the Charities & Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended) and the charity's constitution.

## 2 Nature and purpose of funds

Unrestricted funds are those that may be used at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the objects of the charity. Restricted funds may only be used for specific purposes. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for specific purposes.

### 3 Related party transactions

No remuneration or personal expenses was paid to any trustees or connected persons during the year (2023/24: Nil)

### 5 Transfers between funds

There was one transfer between restricted and unrestricted funds during the period. £300 of restricted income was left unspent on the 2024 log house project. We were permitted to retain this balance and allocate it to other projects.

### 6 Note on project and other expenditure

Project expenditure was much reduced in the year due to the exceptional amount of activity in the prior year (mainly the children's log house which cost £7.7k).

The main item of volunteer equipment was for another £399 water bowser. With so many small trees planted in recent years we have more and more watering to do.

Meeting expenses were increased as we had a Christmas Social event which cost £362. The rest of the cost was for room hire, catering and speaker expenses for the three open meetings we had during the year.

## 7 Assets held by the charity

The charity owns several gardening tools and similar "assets", the most valuable of which are two water bowsers on wheels.

## Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of Friends of the Meadows and Bruntsfield links

I report on the accounts of the charity for the year ended 31st March 2025 which are set out in pages 1 to 7 above.

### Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities

Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended). The charity trustees consider that the audit requirement of Regulation 10(1) (d) of the 2006 Accounts Regulations does not apply. ## Basis of independent examiner's statement
