If you're a parent who's in the throes of toilet training your toddler - what do you do? And there are other issues arising from the lack of toilet facilities that affect all of us. Visiting Edinburgh? According to an article in the Edinburgh Evening News [13] April], around 12 public toilets in Edinburgh are under threat of closure. The reason?



Saving money. Some of these facilities are located in parks which are very popular particularly in the summer - where are visitors supposed to go? Public urination is already a problem and with closures looming it will surely get worse. So will the costs to tourism and cleaning up outweigh having toilet facilities? There is a public consultation on the matter so make sure you have your say via The City of Edinburgh Council website. PTUK has sent some information to support the Convener of one of the park spaces in her campaign to keep the toilets open and this has been gratefully received. Fingers crossed the

Hawes Pier: Are you one of the huge number of visitors who use the toilets at



Hawes Pier on your visit to Queensferry? If so do complete the survey mentioned above to keep these toilets open because they are also under threat. Hawes Pier is used by passengers visiting the area not only by car but by cruise liner so it seems strange that visitors who will boost the local economy will not be able to 'spend a penny'.

Loos in Cornwall There is concern in Fowey that the public toilets will not be ready for use in the summer. This was the subject of an article in the Cornish Guardian [29

March]. Apparently there is a lack of clarity with regard to ownership for 3 of the toilets whilst the 4th is being refurbished. Hopefully as we are now in May the situation has been resolved. With the tourist season looming toilets are vital and the fact that users will have to pay 20p to use them to help with running costs is better than having no loos at all!

London Bridge station: London Bridge station itself may not be falling down but it is certainly falling down on its toilet provision! Anyone reaching the platform and



needing a loo is in for a shock – platform toilets have closed! Travellers now have a choice - 'hold on' or risk missing the train in order to seek out the nearest toilets which are now located at The Vaults by the escalator and will cost you 30p! Is this progress? Is it Customer Service?

Hovering takes on another meaning! Some years ago there was a trend to have alternative signs for men and women's toilets on toilet doors. Usually the signs are
