Pedestrian Area Improvement

The pedestrian area at the southern boundary of Bruntsfield Links adjoining Bruntsfield Terrace and Greenhill Gardens corner has, over a long period, deteriorated into a very unsightly space (*see photo opposite*).

In particular Council bin lorries have driven up over the pavement kerb to gain access to litter bins on the walkway that leads to Whitehouse Loan. They have done this for years because fixed bollards have prevented them from driving straight onto the tarmac areas and instead they drive over the grass, resulting in a dreadful muddy area.

Members of Greenhill and Church Hill Amenity Association and FOMBL worked together to prepare a layout drawing with specifications which were agreed by Mike Shields (Council parks officer). These proposals include: new folding, lockable bollards, dropped kerbs, granite setts to cover muddy areas, new smarter litter bins, relocation of the information board to a more prominent location, two or three new planters and installation of barriers to deflect cyclists from hitting pedestrians at the Greenhill Gardens corner.

Last year funds were allocated to complete the majority of the proposals and it is hoped that additional sums could be made available to augment work completed. No work took place last year but it is hoped that work will commence soon.

Meadows Marathon

The Meadows Marathon will take place on Sunday 7 March 2010. Registration for the half marathon and 5km fun run is now open alongside a newly updated website <u>www.meadowsmarathon.org.uk</u>. The event is an entirely student volunteer-led project, and the organization team aims to smash all previous records and raise £100,000 for local and national charities, as well as attracting over 1,000 runners.

It will take place around the historical area of the Meadows, in the centre of Edinburgh, which has stunning views of the city's well-known landmarks. The event is aimed at all levels of runner, and it only costs the small amount of £15 to register, to encourage maximum participation from local charities. The organizers believe that exercise should be fun and so, on the day, various entertainments will be provided, including radio DJs, celebrities and performance acts, all designed to spur on the competitors.

As well as the website, runners and supporters can also find information and news about the event on the facebook group, Meadows Half Marathon, which has already gained over 500 members. John Owens, editor of *myRace*, commented, 'The Meadows Marathon is perhaps the most vibrant and exciting half marathon in the whole of Scotland. The atmosphere on the day is electric and it's fantastic to see so many students and keen runners taking part in the name of charity. The costumes last year were well thought out, and it will be interesting to see what some runners come up with this year.'

This year's Project Manager, Sally Hutchby, has been involved with the Meadows Marathon for the past two years and is keen to carry on its success. Sally commented, 'I am thrilled to be part of this project for another year and hope to carry on its legacy. This year we want to make the Meadows Marathon even bigger and better and are going to be pulling out all the stops. We want to show that Edinburgh's students play an active role in the community and that they can bring their energy and enthusiasm together to raise funds for a whole range of deserving causes.'

Background information

The event was founded in 2007 by Paul Hewett and Alex Robertson, two mathematicians from the University of Edinburgh. The Meadows Marathon is returning for its fourth consecutive year. Last year's event was one of the biggest student-organized road races in the UK, and 850 runners raised £50,000 for charity. The team believes that any charity can become involved and that the event is accessible to all.
