PROJECTS UPDATE August 2020

- Alison Carr and other volunteers have been clearing tree bases and protecting some trees. Alison has mulched and watered many young trees at south Links. She also fixed a mesh guard around a rare Tulip tree which had been getting seriously damaged by young children.
- Volunteers have been cutting Docks and nettles before they seed at South Links and Leamington Walk wildflower meadow. (see photo)
- Benet Haughton has been very active in repairing failed wire cages and posts around young trees.



- Alan Gevers (playground officer) has agreed to order and install new play equipment (trampoline and see-saw) at West Links playground and East toddlers' playground adjacent to the tennis courts.
- EWH has been held up on the procurement process for designing and installing new info boards but hope this will resume soon.

- A painter is due to start painting some low railings in late August.
- No funding is now available for repair of muddy, worn areas.
- Bridget is organising a plaque for Robin Morris.
- The Buglife pollinator project has been extended into next year with further seeding planned for the Autumn/Spring.
- Spring seeding failed at South Links due to dry weather but the new wildflower areas off Leamington Walk have fared better thanks to seeding by Tim Duffy.
- Heather Goodare has generously paid for two new trees and hope planting will proceed adjacent to Glengyle Crescent in the Autumn.

The Thriving Green Spaces Project

This project will shape an ambitious new vision for Edinburgh's natural environment and produce a 30-year strategy and action plan to deliver that vision. Starting on 29 June the project team conducted three short, interactive surveys for anyone who lives or works in Edinburgh:

- How do you use and what do you think of Edinburgh's green and blue spaces?
- Active Commuting in Edinburgh
- Using Quiet Routes after dark

These surveys were developed with the help of a number of masters students from the Landscape and Wellbeing programme at the University of Edinburgh, one of the partners working with the Council on this project. The project is made possible by a £899,500 grant from the National Lottery Heritage Fund (NLHF) and the Natural Trust (NT), who have joined together to provide funding to local authorities to enable them to develop bold and innovative financial and management solutions for their green spaces against a backdrop of financial uncertainty. Alongside the Council, bid partners are: Greenspace Scotland, Scottish Wildlife Trust, Edinburgh and Lothians Greenspace Trust, University of Edinburgh and the Edinburgh Green Spaces Forum (the umbrella group for Edinburgh's friends of parks groups).

Obituary - Chris Wigglesworth

Members of Merchiston Community Council and Friends of the Meadows and Bruntsfield Links were sad to hear of the death on 4 April of Chris Wigglesworth. Others will write of his roles as a City of Edinburgh ward councillor, a church minister and as a community activist through his association with Tollcross Community Council (of which his wife Ann was an active member), but what we in MCC and FoMBL will remember with particular gratitude and affection is his unflinching championship of local people whether or not they were his constituents, lived within the Tollcross area and/or shared his political views. Chris frequently supported us at the Licensing Board, and MABLAG (Meadows & Bruntsfield Links Action Group), while he and Ann regularly flew the community councils flag at the Meadows and Canal Festivals. Chris was Convenor of FoMBL from 2009 to 2011.

He was a man blessed with great wisdom which he wore lightly yet was always willing to share with others when required. And, as many are saying, he quite simply was "a lovely man".

We will miss him and we send our deepest condolences to his family.

Chris's funeral took place at 11am on Thursday 16 April and was for obvious reasons a family-only event. Anyone wishing to see a recording of the funeral can do so via the following website:
